On one hand my kids are finishing up their academic years while the Nicaraguan school system continues so that means still continuing to pay university scholarships. Once my kids are out of school our days are much less structured but full nonetheless. In June we received a group of 21 high schoolers from Maranatha Prep School in Pasadena, CA. They worked hard moving dirt piles around the pool, painting three new murals, acting out Bible stories for the children at the feeding program, playing in the indoor soccer tournament and hosting youth group nights. Overall, it was a hard-working and fun group of high schoolers.



Yet while all was going well with the team, Halle and Kathy had received word that Halle’s father’s health was failing quickly. With about four days left for the team, Halle and Kathy decided that they needed to go be with Halle’s father and the rest of his family. In less than 24 hours they made plans and left for Seattle. They arrived after midnight and made it to Halle’s parents’ house in time to be with his dad for about 20 minutes before he passed away. What God timing! Back in Nicaragua we were all so glad that they made it back in time to see each other. While it was a busy next four days for me, I really wanted Halle and Kathy to go, and I could not have asked for better leaders of a team to work with as we made those last four days work out smoothly!



However, the same day that Halle and Kathy were travelling, we found out that one of our night guards suddenly had a heartache in his home and died. It was very tragic and much of the neighborhood was out in the rain that night helping support the family as they decided how to deal with this loss. At times like these I am often at a loss of what to say, but God reminds me of His goodness and faithfulness even amidst the difficult moments and gives me the words to pray with those who are struggling.



While there are tragedies and struggles, there are also good moments like going out to dinner last week with the couple Thomas and I had counseled and been praying for. It was such a joy to hear them talk of changes they have made in their relationship with God, with each other and with their daughter. Also, to see the twinkle in their eyes as they looked at each other and whispered back and forth spoke volumes. To have gone from such anger and separation to such love and intimacy is a testimony to how God can take what looks impossible to the world and mend it together again!
