### From Amanda

**In our last letter I wrote** “as we look to 2013 we know that God has a lot planned.” That has proven to be very true in these first couple of months. What we did not know at that moment was that it included a new baby! As both our children have mentioned above, we are expecting our third child in August and are very excited.



January is always a busy month as it is the end of summer here in Nicaragua and therefore, it is back-to-school season. There are many decisions to be made regarding scholarships for youth especially at the college level, and there is the annual plan to order enough school supplies for anywhere between 500-600 backpacks. The great part is that while every year the program seems to grow, at the same time it also becomes easier. In the years of living in Nicaragua I have learned that so many of the women who live around us are more than willing to help me out in little ways. This year I had three different women collecting report cards from children in the neighborhood so that I could go through each one to create my backpack list. Over the years the families have learned that I only accept children who have passed all of their classes and that I have definitely gotten better at catching the tricks like using whiteout over bad grades or the school year. This was the first year that I did not receive any faked or changed report cards.



In January we always host a team from St Paul’s Methodist Church from State College, PA. This team is such a blessing to us. In part because they come and help pack all 650 backpacks! And also because over the years many members have returned year after year and because of that we feel like we are welcoming old friends every time they return. This year two of the ladies who love to sew decided that it would be a fun treat to sew little drawstring bags for all the preschool-aged children who would be receiving school supplies. We hosted a sewing class and had about 13 women from the neighborhood help us sew the 65 preschool bags. After finishing the bags the ladies were then able to make for themselves a purse and a little pouch for carrying change or makeup. Overall, it was a great way to work side by side on a project that would benefit children from the community. At the end of their time with us we delivered all of the backpacks to the children in three different communities.



This year the scholarship program continues to focus more and more on college scholarships.

Currently, there are 49 university students in the program with another 8 waiting to complete their final year. College in Nicaragua is a five-year experience with four years of classes and one final course that is focused specifically in the area of study. The final course can often cost two to three times the normal yearly cost and because of that, many students have a hard time saving the money to be able to finish. The final course does not begin until a certain number of students have registered and therefore, many of the students to whom I have given scholarships find themselves waiting for other students to save their money before they can actually take the course. Can you imagine having to wait a year or two before being able to finish your degree to graduate?



At the end of February we welcomed a group of 10 students from Omaha, Nebraska who are part of a program called IBEX through Lifegate Church. They are here for 5 weeks living and working alongside us in order to experience missions firsthand. They have been a fun group to get to know, and our children have really enjoyed hanging out with them throughout the day. They have done lots of painting and gardening around the sports center. In the afternoons they are often out playing with the children from the community or running the library and offering different crafts for the kids to do. One day a week they have offered a free beauty salon offering haircuts, manicures and pedicures to the ladies and girls in the community. My prayer is that they have enjoyed their time with us in Nicaragua and at the same time that God has stretched each one of them and inspired them for their futures.
